BRUNO KREISKY AND GEORG LEBER DISCUSS "SECURITY OUESTIONS"

WIESBADEN, BRD, Oct. 23 (IPS)--IPS reporters discovered today that Austrian Chancellor Bruno Kreisky, supposedly in West Germany for a meeting with insurance companies, was actually in a secret meeting at a restaurant here with West German Defense Minister Georg Leber. The town of Wiesbaden contains a NATO headquarters. When confronted on his knowledge of and complicity with the Rockefeller implementation body, the Trilateral Commission, Kreisky replied: "Oh, no, I just came to discuss security questions with Minister Leber."

As Herr Kreisky knows, such discussions are in open violation of the 1955 Treaty of Neutrality, which established Austria's neutrality and the withdrawal of Soviet occupation forces from the country. Last year, when Leber was invited to tour U.S. military installations by U.S. Secretary of Defense Schlesinger, he was accompanied on his visit by only one man--the Chief Chaplain to the Austrian Army (Bundesherr). Evidently Herr Kreisky would rather confess to violations of the treaty which rid Austria of occupation forces than admit any connection with the Trilateral Commission.

IPS EXCLUSIVE INTERVIEW MANPOWER EXPERT GINZBERG DISCUSSES HIS NAZI MODEL

NEW YORK, Oct. 21 (IPS) -- Dr. Eli Ginzberg, leading fascist manpower planner and the newly appointed head of the National Commission for Manpower Policy, stated last week that he was disappointed that workers are refusing to make the necessary sacrifices to "solve the energy crisis."

Ginzberg, who uses Columbia University's Graduate Business School as his current base of operations, told IPS: "The country is nowhere near accepting the seriousness of the energy crisis. If the President and the public would recognize the energy crisis, then a military-type mobilization of resources and manpower would be conceivable to solve the problem."

Ginzberg, who has been intimately involved in the planning of every major piece of manpower legislation since World War II, has direct links to the Rockefeller-funded Tavistock Clinic and its founder John Rawlings Rees. As a psychiatric consultant to the Army during the War, Ginzberg proclaims himself as "one of Tavistock's earliest visitors." Talking about the work that Tavistock has done in destroying the minds of the world's working class, Ginzberg stated: "They have really done some excellent work." He differentiated himself from Rees' shocktroopers saying: "Most of those guys were apolitical. I'm much more politically conscious than they were. I know how to get things done."

Ginzberg believes in "the full utilization of all available manpower." He was extremely disturbed by the fact that the Army "wasted so many available recruits who were classified as psychologically unfit."

In his book <u>The Uneducated</u> Ginzberg reflects on a possible solution: "Under the Nazis, the Germans set a very low mental
