Drafsdahl printed his silly statement in the pseudo-left rag, Politisk Revy this past spring, only three weeks after the ELC established a chapter in Denmark! The Dragsdahl piece represented the introduction of the U.S. CIA line to Denmark.

The escalation of slander in the DCP occurs in the wake of effective ELC interventions into public DCP meetings in recent weeks, demanding that the leadership clarify its proposals to fight the international Rockefeller-directed attacks on working class organizations and standards of living. At one such meeting, DCP chairman Knud Jespersen, after swinishly saying "the Soviet Union doesn't need our help," responded hysterically to an ELC question: "You ELC, you go around various countries organizing workers. Listen, I wouldn't even dare tell workers in this suburb what to do."

Unfortunately, so far it appears that Mr. Jespersen was not exaggerating. DCP activity in recent weeks has been focused on a frantic effort to mobilize an estimated half million workers to demonstrate Nov. 26 in Copenhagen. So far the DCP's only response to worker ferment, now at fever pitch in the midst of the highest unemployment since the war, is to cry "Dump Hartling" (the minority liberal Prime Minister) and to call for a series of domestic public works projects to be paid for by "the state"—conveniently neglecting to say where the state must go in a depression to finance any further expansion.

The "National Roads" Disease

What is happening now within certain leadership layers of the DCP is hardly limited to Denmark. The ELC is demanding a united Europeanwide defense of the working class built around the development of a fusion power alternative and maintenance of production at the expense of Rockefeller financial interests. The slimier Communist leadership in Europe, including confessed CIA agent Amendola of the Italian Communist Party and Hermansson of Swedish Communist Party, have, like Jaspersen, come out with a very strange line, claiming that the Soviet Union can handle its own problems. This anti-Soviet "national roads to socialism" hogwash, combined with acceptance of Rockefeller-imposed austerity measures -- if adopted by the masses of CP-influenced workers in Scandinavia and Europe -- would provide the basis for mass demoralization and brutal decimation of the working class. The Norlund Jespersen leadership of the DCP must answer to the working class for its advocacy of the CIA/Amendola line.

MASS STRIKE FERMENT GROWS IN FRANCE; GISCARD NO LONGER USEFUL TO ROCKEFELLER

Nov. 20 (IPS) -- Working class ferment is reaching fever proportions in France, following yesterday's general strike and massive demonstrations. 400,000 workers demonstrated in Paris alone, and hundreds of thousands in other major cities throughout the country: 60,000 in Marseilles; 50,000 in Lyon and Toulouse; and in Brittany, masses

masses of enraged workers took to the streets.

While metal and chemical industry workers responded massively to the strike call, most other sectors of the economy were affected by this combativeness. In spite of growing lay-off threats, workers are showing their determination to fight.

In this context, Minister of the Interior Poniatowski's offensive -- using police intervention against the postal strikers and mobilizing 3,000 men to scab on the Paris garbage collectors' strike -- is becoming next to impossible. Working masses will not go along with Poniatowski's obvious counterinsurgency.

The battle temperament of French workers means for Rockefeller that the Giscard government is losing all usefulness. The only way to impose the necessary "restructuring" policies now under discussion by the Common Market and Group of 10 may well be through "Socialist" participation in the government, an occassion for which the French Socialist Party has been preparing.
