An 'active' woman who was diagnosed with bile duct cancer aged just 23 has revealed the early warning signs that she ignored.

Sydney Towle, from California, received her diagnosis in early August after doctors discovered a 'sizable mass' in her stomach that had been growing for four months.

'I'm typically an active person but suddenly I started feeling short of breath, and this strange burning sensation took hold in my tummy,' she shared

The young woman admitted that she had initially overlooked her symptoms and is now urging others not to skip their regular health checkups 'After ignoring my symptoms, I finally decided to go to the doctor. They did an

ultrasound, then an MRI and a biopsy,' Sydney explained.

'When I received those initial MRI results, and they pointed to a solid mass in my liver, I just knew it was cancer

'I immediately called my family, tears streaming down my face. It took me quite a while to fully grasp the reality of my diagnosis.

Bile duct cancer, also known as cholangiocarcinoma, is an aggressive type of cancer that starts in the bile ducts.

It can affect people of different ages but it is more commonly diagnosed in adults over the age of 50.

Sydney, whose tumor arose from a genetic mutation, admitted that the most challenging aspect of her journey has been dealing with the unknown

'It's tough for me to plan for the future at all or expect anything when everything is so fragile around my diagnosis and treatment,' she said.

'It's also really hard to plan in the short term, such as dinners or going out with friends, when I don't know how I'll feel physically or emotionally on a given day.

'There are so many things I want to do now, given that I don't know how much longer I have, but I can't plan my bucket list or any fun trips while receiving treatment and not knowing where surgery will take me.

Sydney is currently undergoing aggressive treatment targeting the tumor with a variety of treatments, including chemotherapy and experimental drugs

'One thing I've continued doing throughout my treatment is staying active. I still enjoy like hot yoga, long walks, and surfing with friends,' she added.

'It's also helped me stay busy and keep my mind off my diagnosis

'The oncology nurses at my chemo center are such a blessing. I am so grateful for their positive attitudes and smiles every time I go in for treatment.

'The Cholangiocarcinoma Foundation has been especially helpful in providing resources and connecting me with other young people around the world who are fighting bile duct cancer. It does help knowing I'm not alone.'

Sydney began documenting her cancer journey on TikTok, starting from the day she was diagnosed.

'I have always shared every part of my life on TikTok - it gives me a place to vent and share my emotions and hope that others can connect with me or be inspired somehow 'she said.

'This has taken a life of its own throughout my journey, as countless people have reached out with their personal stories and how they are inspired by my journey so far.

Looking to the future, Sydney has big

'Australia and New Zealand are calling my name for starters, and I'll be checking off my bucket list like it's a todo list - but it's not just about me,' she

'I want to keep inspiring and helping others. Volunteering at a chemo center seems like a meaningful path.'

She advises others: 'Don't skip those regular healthcare check-ups, and never ignore any health concerns.

'I did that, assuming youth could shield me from serious issues, and it taught me a tough lesson.

A woman has announced her own death from **cancer** in a heartbreaking LinkedIn post in which she describes how she 'chose joy' in the final days of her life.

Daniella Thackray, 25, a HR professional from Leeds, had pre-written her thoughtprovoking final words for her family to post on her behalf after her death from a rare and aggressive form of bile duct cancer, also known as cholangiocarcinoma.

The post has since racked up nearly 35,000 likes as people were left moved by Daniella's positive outlook despite her tragic circumstances

As she paid tribute to her family, fiancé Tom, and dog Leo, Daniella - who worked as a 'people administrator' at a digital marketing agency, encouraged her network to 'enjoy the little things' in life and 'cherish every moment'.

She wrote: 'If you're reading this then it means I have died from my battle with cancer and my family are posting my final message on my behalf.

'And lastly to my dear, beautiful Tom, I love you and always will. Thank you for supporting me and bringing so much love and happiness into my life. Go enjoy your life now, you deserve it.'



Right now, because the cancer tumor in his main common bile duct is advanced and very involved with the artery, it is not safely operable. Its location also inhibits liver function. He does not currently meet strict and specific criteria for a donor liver transplant. Plans right now, after second opinions and consults with specialists, is to first start chemotherapy and see if it is possible to shrink down the bile duct tumor- as long as the liver stays stable enough, the liver's needs will be addressed secondary.

So far he has had numerous testing, stents, strictures, biopsies, liver drains, and chemo port placement.



Hello, I'm Ryan and in March 2023 I was diagnosed with a rare form of cancer called Cholangiocarcinoma or Bile Duct Cancer. My specific type is Stage 3b and only 3,000 people are diagnosed every year (the average age tends to be 70 and I have yet to find stats for people diagnosed before age 40).

It's been a long rollercoaster of surgery and multiple infections which has sent me back to the hospital numerous times in the last 5 1/2 months. I have pretty decent insurance, yet I'm still accumulating thousands of dollars in medical debt due to the hospitalizations and many trips to Upstate Cancer Center for follow-ups, labs, genetic testing, etc...

Currently I have had to delay continuing chemotherapy treatments due to a tendency to get bacterial infections from my biliary drain. These usually first appear as a fever accompanied by chills. For perspective, this has delayed my chemotherapy over 3 months now until my doctors can get things under control.

The surgery was very successful in removing the tumor that had spread into my liver, 2 lymph nodes and bile ducts. However some microscopic cancer cells remained in some of my bile ducts as the ducts were too small to remove or resect. Hence the need for chemotherapy and radiation treatments to make sure everything will be gone.

Unfortunately, the longer these delays go on the more at risk I am for relapsing.

Ryan says: "I have yet to find stats for people diagnosed before age 40."

<u>June 12, 2023</u> – Louisville, OH – 33 year old Bobby Courtney was diagnosed, in May 2023, with Stage 4 metastatic Cholangiocarcinoma as well as primary sclerosing cholangitis.

This fundraiser is to help support Robert "Bobby" Courtney and his wife Katie (Karahuta) through his fight with cancer. They are new parent's to their son Asher who just turned 5 months old. I have known Katie since she was born, as her Mom is one of my oldest friends. I am starting this fundraiser in hopes to help her family with medical and living expenses so they can focus on Bobby's treatment.

Bobby has dealt with the diagnosis of Ulcerative Colitis, amongst other health conditions since 2008. In 2018, the Cleveland clinic located a 2cm precancerous polyp that was successfully removed in his transverse colon. His UC has been in remission since 2019, with the acceptation of occasional flare ups. In May of 2023 Bobby began vomiting. This isn't uncommon, he has frequent panic attacks and tends to vomit while having one. The vomiting lasted on and off for 2 weeks. They began communicating with his GI doctor at the Cleveland clinic, who ordered blood tests. They realized his liver enzymes were rising quickly and asked for him to come into the main campus ER. This is where he was diagnosed with acute pancreatitis with an unknown cause. He underwent an MRI where they found enlarged lymph nodes in the groin and by the kidneys, as well as small nodules on the perineum, thickening of the upper right portion of the liver, and a complete obstruction of a bile duct. At this point, Bobby became jaundice. They biopsied the retro peritoneal lymphnodes and confirmed he had stage 4 metastatic cholangiocarcinoma as well as primary sclerosing cholangitis (another autoimmune condition that people with ulcerative colitis can develop, that unfortunately can lead to liver failure/cancer). Bobby found out the news 3 days before his 34th birthday, which was also spent in the hospital. The current course of action is Chemotherapy, and we pray it works to kill or shrink the

tumors in his body. He does not qualify for immunotherapy due to the ulcerative colitis. This is a very aggressive cancer with a long road of treatment ahead.

May 10, 2023 - UK - 35 year old Chris McGinnis was diagnosed with Cholangiocarcinoma and was given 12 months to live. He died only 3 months after diagnosis.

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

'I have barely 2% chance of living but I'm determined to beat this cancer'

28 year old doctor Gareth Honeybone reveals why he's still laughing despite his diagnosis of deadly bile duct cancer

"I've always been funny in quite a dry way," says Gareth, 28. "Even during my treatment I'd say things that people found funny, though slightly strange. I suppose it's my coping mechanism."

Gareth is well versed in being on both sides of the desk when it comes to breaking bad news to patients. When he's not performing at comedy clubs, he's a junior maxillofacial surgeon at the Northern General Hospital in Sheffield.

"At work I'm on the wards, in surgery or seeing patients in my clinic, many of whom may have mouth cancer," he says. "Then, only a few hours after leaving hospital, I'm trying to make an audience laugh about my own cancer experience. It's quite a contrast."

In November 2022, while having a regular blood test to monitor his Crohn's, doctors found a liver abnormality caused by a blocked bile duct. This turned out to be a rare chronic disease called primary sclerosing cholangitis, in which the body's own immune system attacks the bile ducts which connect the organs in the digestive system.

As Gareth's condition worsened, he became yellow with jaundice. So in February last year he underwent what he describes as his "big operation". During six hours of surgery, his bile duct, gall bladder and lymph nodes, along with other tissue and veins, were all removed before his bowel was rerouted. "My doctors suspected the bile duct blockage was caused by a cancerous tumour, so as a precaution they took everything out," says Gareth. "It was only later, once everything had been examined, that cancer was confirmed."

Gareth was diagnosed with cholangiocarcinoma (CCA) — also known as bile duct cancer — which is extremely aggressive and has a has a poor mortality rate of 97.4 per cent. If caught early, surgery is a potential cure. Following his surgery, he had six months of chemotherapy. Despite the gruelling treatment, he was back at work by July.

I started the article with a 23 year old woman, and I'm ending the article with a 28 year old man. Both are dying from a disease where the average age is 70.

There are <u>13,146 Oncologists</u> practicing in the United States. Not one is speaking out. How is it possible for an entire medical specialty to implode and fail?

As a physician, when a 20 year old shows up in your office, dying from a disease that affects 70 year olds, you start asking questions. When 10 show up, you present at International Conferences and write papers about it.


