A young Australian woman suffered gut issues for months before finding out she **had stage three bowel cancer**.

Elise Stapleton thought of bowel **cancer** as an 'old person's disease' before both she and her sister were diagnosed within two years of each other in their mid-thirties.

The 37-year-old initially thought her symptoms, including abdominal pain and diarrhoea, were related to her endometriosis which she had struggled with for years.

However, a pelvic scan found a large mass in her bowel and the months following were filled with multiple surgeries and harsh chemotherapy treatments.

But while it was a painful and challenging time for Elise, her journey through cancer wasn't all dark. She had met a man on Hinge who supported her during treatment.

In March 2021, Elise's 39-year-old sister Lana had been diagnosed with stage three bowel cancer so her family swiftly got themselves checked for the disease.

Elise's tests came back normal and there were no genetic links found.

So less than a year later when Elise started experiencing symptoms, she never would have suspected cancer.

'I had very sporadic abdominal pain more so on my left side, loose bowels and diarrhoea. I was going to the bathroom all the time and had some fatigue but everyone feels tired these days,' she said.

She suspected it was her endometriosis 'flaring up' as the symptoms were very similar so she waited three months before eventually visiting her gynaecologist in October of 2022.

The doctor recommended a pelvic scan to see what was going on with her endometriosis but it picked up a lesion in her bowel.

'At that point, my heart stopped. I was like, "Oh my god, it's cancer" because no one wants to hear the word "lesion",' she said.

With her sister's history, Elise said her gynaecologist 'didn't muck around' and was quick to get more specialists on board and conduct further tests and scans.

'Thankfully the MRI and CT (scans) came back saying there was no suspicion for malignancy,' Elise recalled.

Elise's gynaecologist and colorectal surgeon determined the lesion was likely her endometriosis causing the uterine lining to grow on her bowel so she was scheduled for a laparoscopy to remove it.

'I was planning to start a family and they said I need to be fit to be a mum so let's do the endo surgery. I was going in for my fourth laparoscopy,' she said.

But surgeons were not sure certain what they were going in for. Elise would either need a small hole punch procedure or a full abdominal surgery if they found the mass was more serious.

'My sister dropped me off and I had packed a bag for the night and said "I'll see you all tomorrow",' Elise recalled.

'It probably was better going into the surgery with that attitude but it led to the biggest shock of my life once they woke me up.'

Elise knew something wasn't right when she came to from the anaesthesia to see her surgeon and two nurses at the foot of her bed.

'I've had a few surgeries knowing you just have that one nurse beside you. I looked at my surgeon and said, "There's something wrong",' she said.

The surgeon broke the news they had found a mass and was '99 per cent sure' it was bowel cancer even though they had to wait for pathology results to confirm.

'I did believe that misconception that bowel cancer is an older person's disease and it's really not. My sister opened my eyes up a little bit but then I thought it wouldn't happen to me,' Elise said.

'It came as a complete shock. My world turned upside down that day.'

Just a few weeks after recovering from her surgery Elise returned to hospital to have another procedure where 30cm of her bowel was removed as well as some lymph nodes where the cancer had spread.

'Your bowels take a while to get back into the swing of it. It stops your bowel function, I had an enema, I couldn't open my bowels and then it's the opposite, I was constipated for a week, I needed laxatives in hospital,' she said.

'They've interrupted that flow of everything then you're on a soft diet, you can't really eat. There were a lot of changes going on in my body. The body is an amazing thing though, it's very resilient.'

Elise then endured six rounds of chemotherapy over a gruelling three months.

'It was pretty horrible to go through what I went through, I would wish it on no one,' she said.

Before her first surgery and diagnosis and despite her health scare, she was still swiping on the dating app Hinge and matched with a man named Kieran.

The pair started chatting and went on a couple of dates where they hit it off.

'I had kind of given up on men and I was like, "This is not going to happen", but then he completely blew me out of the water,' she said.

'We had a really good connection then we kept in contact via phone calls and messages. He went to Hawaii and was there at the time of my surgery.'

- March 2021, 39 year old Lana Stapleton was diagnosed with Stage 3 Colon Cancer
- genetic testing of the whole family showed no genetic links
- her sister Elise Stapleton began experiencing abdominal symptoms a year later in early 2022 and in late 2022 doctors thought she had endometriosis and was booked for surgery
- during surgery she was diagnosed with Stage 3 colon cancer

Craig Roh, a former college football standout at the University of Michigan, died on Feb. 26 at age 33 after grappling with colon cancer for 18 months, his wife, Chelsea Roh, announced on X, formerly Twitter.

"God brought Craig home," she wrote on the social media platform. "Craig was not very public with his battle."

According to a GoFundMe that Chelsea Roh shared, doctors diagnosed Craig Roh with stage 4 colon cancer in August 2022. The GoFundMe noted that the money raised will help Chelsea Roh and her son, Max, pay off medical expenses and cover school for him.

"Craig did not want to go public with his diagnosis and battle because in true Craig fashion, he did not want the attention to be on him," the GoFundMe stated. "From chemo to targeted therapy to clinical trials at MD Anderson and in Honduras, Craig was resilient till the very end."

Oct. 17, 2023 – Detroit, MI – 30s year old Shannon Elizabeth was diagnosed with Colon Cancer, MS, etc.

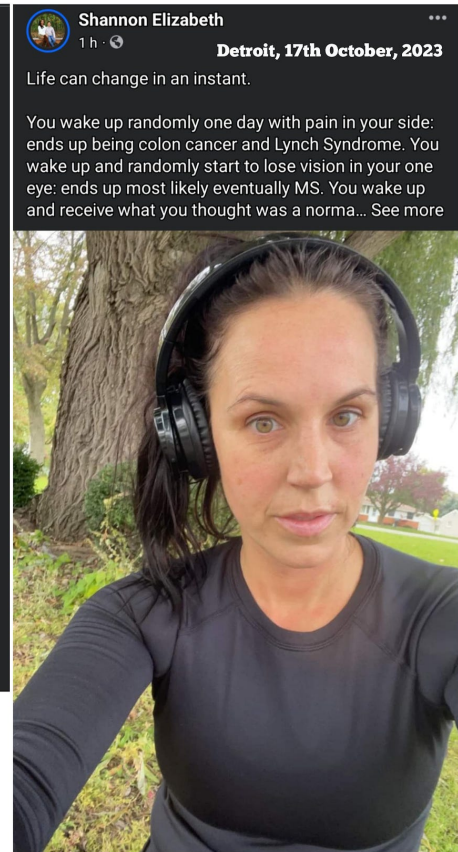


You wake up randomly one day with pain in your side: ends up being colon cancer and Lynch Syndrome. You wake up and randomly start to lose vision in your one eye: ends up most likely eventually MS. You wake up and receive what you thought was a normal phone call: your mom has unexpectedly passed away in the night on Mother's Day. You come home from school to grab your jersey for your soccer game: you find your dad having a brain aneurysm and have to take him off of life support a week later. This list can go on and on filled with challenges and tragedies of the above nature.

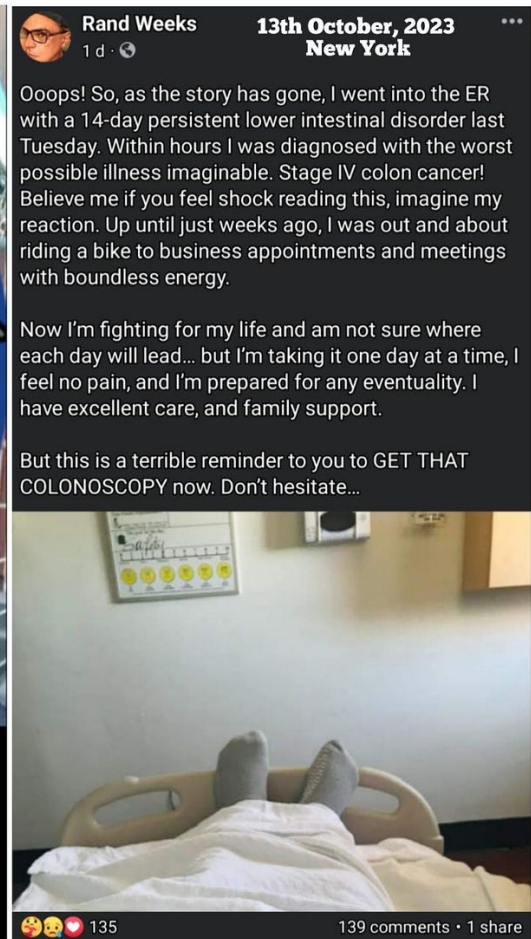
Through all of it, I have made anger my friend and manipulated it into motivation and do NOT take life or anything I can currently do for granted. It is why I have been on this path of crazy and vastly unexpected things. WHO wakes up one day and decides that she wants to become a physicist and then DOES it in her 30s?! Crazy! I know how precious life is - all of it: the good, the bad, the hard, the easy and the ugly.

But on top of that, it is not just that life can change. It is life as you know it can change. I used to just have a Lynch Syndrome cloud hanging over my head, but it now includes MS. Watching my mom lose her cognitive abilities, her mobility, the use of other important functions was watching her, as she described it, dying a very slow death. When I was told that I most likely have developed it or will develop it last fall, I was VERY annoyed and angry.

But, I have gotten to the point where I try to do whatever I can. Like in the picture below completing 3 miles and training for a trail half marathon. Because I have no clue if ever there will come a day when my path diverts to one that my mom had to follow. I hope not, but just in case I wake up on another random day and can't anymore, I am going to do it and enjoy it now.

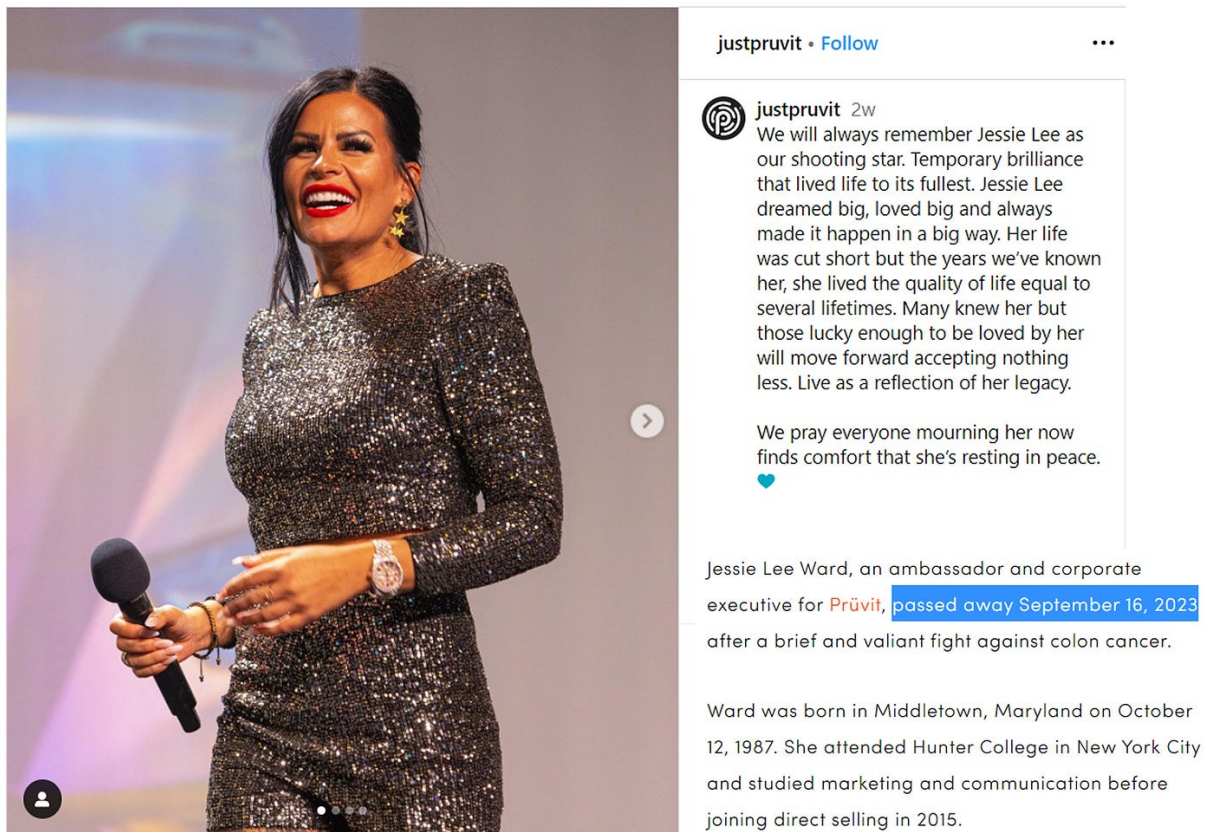

[Sep. 16, 2023](#) - 35 year old Jessie Lee Ward, a corporate marketing executive, was diagnosed with Stage 4 Colon Cancer in March 2023 and died 5 months later on Sep. 16, 2023.



Multi-level marketing seller Jessie Lee Ward has died of **colon cancer** after trying to cure it naturally.

Ward was the vice president of Pruvit, a company that sells ketone supplement products. Pruvit released [a statement about Ward's untimely death on Instagram](#), writing, "Her life was cut short but the years we've known her, she lived the quality of life equal to several lifetimes."

Ward had made a string of controversial statements about cancer treatments since her diagnosis earlier this year, per [The Daily Beast](#).

She shared that she had been diagnosed with stage four colon cancer in March following routine blood work. Her oncologist suggested aggressive chemotherapy to extend her life expectancy; Ward subsequently shared on social media that she doubted her care team's expertise.

After joining Pruvit, Ward rose rapidly through the company's ranks, becoming their top earner and recruiter, building a worldwide network marketing team of a cumulative 1.6 million customers and 21,000 promoters spanning 41 countries.

[Sep. 16, 2023](#) - Burlington, IA - 38 year old Marc Seibrecht fought a one year battle with Stage 4 Colon cancer and died on Sep. 16, 2023.

This is written on behalf of Dustin Kindler who received the devastating news of being diagnosed with Stage 4 Colon Cancer on August 08/28/2023.

After months of stomach issues, Dustin was hospitalized on 08/28/2023 and needed immediate surgery to remove a large tumor that had formed in his colon. The tumor, along with what has spread to lymph nodes has been diagnosed as stage 4 cancer and needs immediate treatment once he's recovered from surgery. So, on 09/18/2023 he had surgery to put in a port for his chemotherapy. Then he started chemotherapy on 09/19/2023. He will have to have chemotherapy for at least 6 months. He will go every two weeks to the oncologist where he will do 2 hours of in-clinic chemotherapy then he will do 46 hours of chemotherapy at home. Then after 46 hours of chemo at home, he goes back to the oncologist and then removes the chemo treatment he will have to do this every 2 weeks for at least 6 months. His road to recovery & remission will be a long one but doctors are hopeful of healing him.

This is a little back story of Dustin's life:

Dustin Kindler is 39 years old. He is a 2x combat veteran of Iraq. He has been married to his wife Melinda Kindler for 18 years. They have two children Kaylee and Karson Smith; they also have three grandchildren. On August 28, 2023, he had to have emergency surgery to remove 1/3 of his colon due to a large mass and blockage, his wife was told that the mass was cancer. They found out that it was Signet Ring Cell Carcinoma stage 4, a rare form of colon cancer.

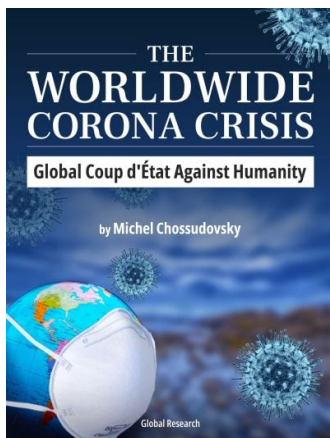
